I. Motivations

I live nearby the Tainan Municipal Wenhua Elementary School in Guiren District. When I was in the first grade, my mother walked with me to and from the school every day till I reached 2nd grade. I started to practice walking to and from school by myself. It is very dangerous for a child to walk alone on the streets.

Although there are crossing guards available on the streets near the school, scooter drivers rush around and the parents' cars block the streets. The students who ride bicycles to and from school would have to pass between the cars. If they are not careful enough, they could bump into each other. Sometimes I walk on my own to the market near the school to buy something. The streets around the market do not have any pedestrian lane. Therefore, it is very dangerous for people to walk around the vehicles. I would like to speak for the children's traffic safety by this child and youth report.


II. The Basis of the Convention on the Rights of the Child

III. Survey Methods


A total of 122 questionnaires were collected using an online survey to find out the traffic safety situations, according to the county and city of residence, age, gender and the commute way.

 Other counties and cities (21)





 \Box Under 6 years old (2) \Box Elementary school student (20) \Box Junior high school student (44) \Box Senior high school student (56)




iii. Gender: (Unit: number of people)

As you can see from the table:

- 1. Overall, the highest percentage of children's traffic safety high-risk behaviors in Tainan City, Taichung City and other counties and cities was crossing the street (56.33% in Tainan City, 66.66% in Taichung City and 66.66% in other counties and cities). It is followed by looking at the cell phone while walking (47.89% in Tainan City, 44.44% in Taichung City and 52.38% in other counties and cities)
- 2. The highest percentage of children's traffic safety high-risk behaviors in Taipei City, New Taipei City and Keelung City was looking at the cell phone while walking (42.86), followed by crossing the street (38.09%)
- 3. Except for Taipei City, New Taipei City and Keelung City, the percentage of the child and the youth who had traffic accidents in other counties and cities was all above 60%, including Tainan City (63.38%), Taichung (77.78%), and other counties and cities (66.66%)
- 4. According to the survey, the most common traffic safety problems encountered among the child and the

youth were as follows. First, parking illegally (72.1%). Secondly, running red lights (65.6%). And thirdly, riding scooters without making a two-step turn while turning left (53.3%)

V. My Suggestions to the Government

59% of the respondents in this survey were from Tainan City, so we would make suggestions mainly for the Tainan City Government.

The casualties of the child and the youth traffic accidents increased in Tainan City from January to November 2021, compared to the same period of time in 2020, according to the latest information from the Quick-View Statistics on the Road Safety Information Network.

The traffic safety of the child and the youth should be taken seriously, because the casualties increased by 1.4% for those aged between 0 and 12 and the casualties increased by 6.8% for those aged between 13 and 17, compared to the same period of time in 2020, according to the traffic accident statistics of Tainan City from January to November 2021.

My suggestions are as follows:

A. The overall environment planning

1. The parking routes around the school should be distinguished.

It is necessary to assign an agent for the traffic in the temporary parking area near the school. And there should be parking space control during the pick-up and drop-off times.

2. Rules and regulations for driving (e.g. running red lights, scooters turning left without a two-step turn, or not yielding to pedestrians)

We should make more efforts to stop these illegal behaviors during peak hours and continue to advocate these rules to increase the public morality.

3. Sidewalk clearance

In the corridor, scooters and bicycles should be pulled along and parked properly, leaving a pedestrian path for two to walk through.

B. Traffic Safety Education for Individual Cognition

1. Crossing the street

To educate students in the schools through real stories and cases, it not only builds up proper traffic safety knowledge, but also increase the probability of obeying.

2. Walking inattentively (e.g. looking at cell phones, playing around)

Putting up signs to remind people, suggesting people to turn on the alert of "Watch the Road!" on their cell phones (available for both Android and IOS) or establishing a traffic light system which has voice for reminding with the image of the little green man.

3. Safety when riding the scooter

- (1) Add a special lane for scooters to decrease the chances of collision between scooters and big vehicles.
- (2) Increase public awareness for people who do not wear helmets and ride with two passengers on their scooters. And also promote the public ride-sharing services.
